In the sprint, there was no stopping the former champion of Belgium. The group sprint was won by Jan Palmans. Initially, Jan was also crowned champion of Antwerp, but after a complaint, he was disqualified along with Frans Aerenhouts. The Antwerp title was not awarded.



Petrus 'Peet' Oellibrandt (°Beveren-Waas 01.12.1935 - +Sint-Niklaas 15.06.2014)

was a strong one-day rider. 'Peet' reached his peak when he won the 1959 Belgian Championship in Herentals, ahead of the still young 'Emperor'. In the race, Rik Van Looy set off on a long flight, but was caught on the local laps. And so it was the slender Waaslander who was able to snatch his first Scheldeprijs.



49th SCHELDEPRIJS

August 1

The start of the race was given at noon in Schoten and the riders went for a big circuit of 160 km through Hoogstraten, Kasterlee, Geel, Herentals, Nijlen. Once they were back in Schoten they had to accomplish four laps of 17 km each.

The race was fast and moved. Five riders broke away in the final lap. They sprinted for victory and Raymond Vrancken, who already won the race three years earlier, was the fastest one.

Raymond Vrancken

(°Tongeren 04.08.1932-+Tongeren 02.04.2011)



Raymond came from a fifteen-child family. He was a really strong young rider. In '55 he won two stages in the Tour of Austria as well as in the Tour of Egypt. In 1957, he turned a professional. He achieved a great career even if he never belonged to the elite. He was a humble guy from Limburg who won 14 professional races, most of them at regional level. His two victories in the Scheldeprijs (1958-1961) are in fact the most important wins of his cycling career. He also won the races of Helchteren, Wellen, Goyer, Grobbendonk and Overijse (1957), the 3rd stage of the de GP Marvan (1958), Tielt and Hoeselt (1959), Geetbets (1960), Borgloon (1961), Lommel (1963) and the Circuit of Limburg (1965). In 1965 and in 1966 he broke his wrist twice and this is when he decided to stop racing. Raymond became a beer merchant in Tongeren.



50th SCHELDEPRIJS July 31

90 riders will take the start of the race but with a twenty minutes delay as a big traffic jam in so-called 'rabbit pipe' made it impossible for riders coming from East and West Flanders to arrive on time in Schoten. André Noyelle, Robert De Middeleir and Pol Rosseel arrived even later and can definitely not start. Peet Oellibrandt is the last one to take place in the buchh on the start line but today the last shall be first! Peet Oellibrandt and John Van Tongerloo break together in the final; Vic Van Schil counter-attacks, but too late. Peet is faster than John and wins the 'golden' Scheldeprijs, which is in fact his second win in Schoten.



Petrus 'Peet' Oellibrandt (°Beveren-Waas 01.12.1935 - *Sint-Niklaas 15.06.2014)

51st SCHELDEPRIJS

July 30

The weather is really hot on that festive Tuesday 1963 in Schoten. Everybody has already the World Championship that will take place on August 11 in Ronse in mind. A race that will make history but the 85 riders who take the start of the 51st of the Scheldeprijs have no idea about that yet. John Van Tongerloo, Huub Zilverberg and Hugo Hellemans attack on the local laps. Peet Oellibrandt bridges the gap on his own. He proves one more time he is the strongest rider. He attacks in the final part while Van Tongerloo, Hellemans and Zilverberg are no longer able to follow him. John from Meerle takes place 2, exactly like he did it the year before. Thanks to this third victory Peet Oellibrandt established a new record.



Peet Oellibrandt and John Van Tongerloo break in the final part of the race, immediately joined by Jos Huysmans, Frans Aerenhouts, Roger De Coninck and Jos Hoevenaars who attacks in the final kilometer. His attack is a very mighty one and nobody is able to bridge the gap. Hoevenaars wins the event.

Jos Hoevenaars (°Antwerpen 30.11.1932- †Wilrijk 14.06.1995)

Jos did not win a lot of races but he nevertheless became an excellent stage races rider. He also won the Flèche Wallonne in 1959, the Sels Cup in 1961 and the Scheldeprijs in 1964 and got many places of honor. He included won the bronze medal of the 1962 World Championship which took place in the Italian city of Salo (behind Stablinski and Elliott). In his quality of stage races rider, he won Naples-Rome-Naples in 1958. He wore the yellow jersey during four days in the Tour de France 1959 and finished the 10th overall in '58, the 8th in 59 and the 11th in 61. He took five in the overall ranking of the Giro '60 and wore the pink jersey during ten days. His professional career took place between 1956 and 1967. Jos died after a long illness when he was only 62 years old.



53rd SCHELDEPRIJS July 27

75 riders took the start of the race and Gust Verhaegen broke alone in the big loop. The bunch caught him when two local laps were left to the finish. The race unavoidably finished in the sprint. Willy Vannitsen won it very easily. He was definitely the fasted rider of the group. A real talent! Young Eddy Merckx, who was then twenty years old, finished at the tenth position.

Willy Vannitsen (°Jeuk 08.02.1935- +Tienen 19.08.2001)

Vannitsen was really talented but he had a very special character and we cannot say that he trained as seriously as a professional rider is supposed to. Willy turned a professional in 1954 and remained in that category till 1966. His main victory is the Flèche Wallonne in 1961. He also won many other one day races (Tour of Tuscany 1958, Tour of Limburg 1957-60, the Three Sister Cities 1955, Milan-Vignola 1961, Tre Valli Varesine 1965...). He won two stages in the Tour (1962) and one in the Giro (the first stage of the edition 1958).



54th SCHELDEPRIJS

August 2

76 competitors presented themselves at the start of the race. Former winner Raymond Vrancken attacked in the big loop. Gust Verhaegen caught him and both riders entered in Schoten with an advantage of 4 minutes. Vrancken was caught after two local laps while Gust went on alone for a while before he was caught and dropped by Frans Brands and Rik Pauwels. Jos Spruyt was the only rider able to bridge the gap with the leaders. Brands suffered later a puncture and Spruyt easily beat Pauwels in the sprint.

Jos Spruyt (°Viersel 25.02.1943)

Jos Spruyt turned a professional rider in 1965 with French team Mercier. He started like Poulidor's team-mate (1965-1967) before becoming Eddy Merckx's one during the longest part of his career (1968-1976). Jos participated in eight Tour de France. In 1967, during his second Tour, he rode the entire fifth stage with the yellow jersey on his shoulders. He won three stages and in 1966 he won of his most beautiful victories: the Scheldeprijs!



55th SCHELDEPRIJS August 1

78 cyclists register for the 55th Scheldeprijs. During the large tour Rik Van Looy quietly disappears from the race after 104 km. Just before entering Schoten Paul In 't Ven take a one minute lead. The 22 year old amateur eventually crosses the finishing line with 30 seconds of his lead remaining.



Paul In 't Ven (°Turnhout 01.04.1945)

In 1967 Paul joined his brother Willy in the Antwerp Mann-Grundig-formation.
His debut was promising: he won in the Scheldeprijs, the GP d'Isbergues, Boom and Heist-op-den-Berg, he became third in the Omloop Mandel-Leie-Schelde and 43rd in the Tour. Afterwards his career went downhill and in 1971 he bode farewell to the world of professional cycling.



56th SCHELDEPRIJS July 30

Ambiguity about Ward Sels'right to participate is the reason for a hectic start at this year's Scheldeprijs. Ward Sels is the only rider for the French Bic team and since the Scheldeprijs is a race for teams, not individuals, Sels shouldn't be allowed to start. The organization however makes an exception and thus is Sels one of the 105 riders starting in this year's Scheldeprijs. A leading group of thirteen including Sels prepare for the sprint in Schoten. Ward Sels takes the victory by a length expects that this will seal his place for the World-Championship later in the year. Nothing seems to be less true...

Edward Sels (°Vorselaar 27.08.1941)

Ward was poised to become the successor of Rik van Looy. He became professional on July 3rd 1963 and immediately won his first four races. In his first full year as professional Ward was the revelation of the peloton: 19 victories, Champion of Belgium, yellow jersey and four stage wins in the Tour de France, stage wins in Paris-Nice, the Vuelta and the Tour of Luxembourg! He won many races amongst them Paris-Brussels 1965, Tour of Flanders 1966 and the Scheldeprijs 1968. A few serious crashes made him quite professional cycling in 1972.



57th SCHELDEPRIJS

July 29

This Scheldeprijs is very lively. The fierce crosswind breaks up the peloton into bits and pieces. Eventually, with echelon after echelon, 45 riders come together at the front. The other riders lose ground metre by metre, until the gap with the leaders reaches seven minutes and they abandon the race. Up front, Rini Wagtmans is very industrious, but the Flandria team, with Walter Godefroot and Roger De Vlaeminck leading the way, is too strong. Walter and Roger take turns to attack and in the end it is Walter who wins.

Walter Godefroot (°Gent 02.07.1943)

is a monument of the cycling sport. He won many big races. Champion of Belgium (1965-72), Liège-Bastogne-Liège (1967), Tour of Flanders (1968-78), Gent-Wevelgem (1968), Paris-Roubaix (1969), Scheldeprijs (1969), Bordeaux-Paris (1969-76), ten stages in the Tour de France and the points classification (1970), Zurich Championship (1970-74), Henninger Turm (1974), one stage in the Giro and two stages in the Vuelta. As an amateur, he won the bronze medal at the 1964 Tokyo Olympics... Later on, he was for many years the sports director of leading teams.
