194 riders started out from Antwerp's Grote Markt and turned it into a fast breakaway race. Despite attacks by first the Mapei block with Museeuw, Steels, Tafi, Peeters, and later by riders such as Knaven, Van Petegem and de Jongh, it all came down to the inevitable bunch sprint. In this, the 31-year-old Endrio Leoni from the modest Alessio team proved to be the strongest, ahead of a disappointed Jeroen Blijlevens, who missed out on a second victory. World champion Oscar Freire finished fourteenth.

Endrio was at times one of the fastest sprinters. His career - from 1990 to 2002 - was full of ups and downs. He won four stages in the Giro, one in the Vuelta and further stages in the Ruta del Sol, Tirreno-Adriatico, Rounds of Algarve, the Netherlands, Portugal and the Settimana Coppi e Bartali. The two consecutive wins in the Scheldeprijs constitute his greatest achievements abroad.

After a breakaway of Ludo Dierckxssens and after that another one with amongst other riders Servais Knaven and Peter van Petegem, a massive sprint was unavoidable. That meant a second win for Endrio Leoni after he already won the previous year.

Endrio Leoni (°Dolo 22.08.1968)

Leoni, short and stocky, was, when he was in a good day, a very fast sprinter able to beat the very best ones. Unfortunately his good days were not numerous. He won 28 professional races, not a lot considering his capacities. He raced during ten seasons in the professional category (1992-2002). 1992 was a good year for him: he won two stages in the Giro and one in the Coppi and Bartali week. In '94 he won again two stages in the Giro and one in the Vuelta. After that he never again won in a major tour. He never took part in the Tour anyway. He also won stages in the Tour of Puglia, Netherlands, Calabria, Portugal, Murcia, Algarve, Andalucia and Castilla y Leon. He fast two times the fastest on the finishing line on the occasion of the Scheldeprijs (2000-2001).

In 2000 he also won the GP Denain (a few days after the Scheldeprijs!), in 1997 he was also the best in the Giro del Lago Maggiore and in 1999 he won the GP Etruschi, the race which opens the Italian season. This was his last victory. In 2002, his last season, he finished the Scheldeprijs at place 16. Since then we know nothing about him.



Several riders try to go in the break but nobody is able to increase the gap till four riders: De Weert, Lauder, Scanlon and Koerts attack and hold a certain advantage. Koerts is dropped when the riders enter Schoten, with two laps left to go. Servais Knaven is the next one to break but he is caught too. It is then Ludovic Capelle's turn to go. This attack is the good one and thanks to his friend Kirsipuu's good job, who perfectly controls the pack, he wins the race. Kirsipuu finishes the race in 2nd place.

(°Namur 27.02.1976)



Ludovic was a very talented rider but the results failed to match up to initial expectations. His career was put in parentheses in 2005 after he tested positive with EPO on the occasion of the Gullegem Koerse. He received an 18-month suspension before he was declared innocent following a procedural mistake. The rider native from Namur became Belgian champion in 2005. He won the Scheldeprijs in 2003 and in 2004 he won his last important victories in Dwars door Vlaanderen and the GP of Isbergues. From 2005 on, the career of the Walloon talented rider started declining rapidly.

A first crash involving Ciolek and Haussler amongst other riders took place at 40 km from the finishing line. At the entrance of the last local lap, the four leaders still had an advantage of 1'07". Knaven and Hammond counterattacked but at 4 km from the line, the bunch was packed together again. Van Avermaet launched his sprint too early and Petacchi, without his teammates' help, chose the right side of the road to come to the front in a very impressive way. Nothing and nobody was still able to defeat him when a very big massive crash happened just behind him.
