

July 29

After barely 10 km, world champion and former winner Georges Ronsse is knocked out because of equipment failure. The race is brought to life by a very industrious Godfried De Vocht. Constant Vromans also rides alone in front for a while. In the finale, Denis Verschueren, the giant of Itegem, is unbeatable. He attacks relentlessly until he is alone at the front. Denis wins by one minute. Jef Wauters, the 1929 winner, beats the peloton in the final sprint for second place.



Denis Verschueren (°Berlaar 02.02.1897-+Lier 18.04.1954)

lived in Itegem and was a big, strong athlete. In the 1920s, 'The giant of Itegem' was one of the best one-day racers. He won Paris-Tours ('25 and '28), the Tour of Belgium ('25), the Tour of Flanders ('26) and Paris-Brussels ('26). Above all, Denis was a Scheldeprijs specialist: 3rd in 1923, 2nd in 1924, 1st in 1930, 3rd in 1931 and 2nd in 1932





21st SCHELDEPRIJS July 28

On Tuesday July 28, the start of the Scheldeprijs was given at 12:45 pm in Schoten. 57 riders took part in the event. The big lap, 90 km, went through Kalmthout, Wuustwezel, Hoogstraten, Turnhout, Oostmalle and Schilde. It was followed by 5 shorter laps through Schoten, Brasschaat and back in Schoten. Ten riders arrived together in Schoten with a big advance and sprinted for victory.



Godfried De Vocht

(°Arendonk 17.03.1908-+Antwerpen 23.10.1985)

'Fried' De Vocht was a very talented rider. In the youth categories, this 'Rik Van Steenbergen-avant-la-lettre' already won a lot of races. In 1929 he won the military Belgian championship and in 1930 he did the same in the independent category. Like a professional, he won twice the Scheldeprijs (1931-32). As a consequence of a harsh crash, he suffered a fractured skull and was later never able to reach the same level again. He was only 24 years old when he put an end to his cycling career.





22nd SCHELDEPRIJS

August 2

55 riders starts the race which goes through Lier and Herentals before finishing with five final laps through Brasschaat. Six riders break at the very beginning of the race: De Vocht, Huys, Verschueren, Vromans, Van Vlockhoven and Gust Verdyck, the local star. This is in fact the breakaway you have to make part of. When the riders are back in Schoten, Van Vlockhoven breaks his handlebars and Fried De Vocht attacks. He is definitely the best and wins his second Scheldeprijs in a row.




23rd SCHELDEPRIJS

August 1

73 professional riders present themselves at Gust Verdyck's pub in Schoten to take their numbers for the event. The race is a really fast one and six riders break just before the bunch enters in Schoten. This is definitely the breakaway you have to make part of. Those six riders remain in the lead till the finish line and Flander Horemans defeats his break mates in the sprint.

Jozef Flander Horemans (°Wondelgem 24.02.1910-+Gentbrugge 15.07.1992)

As a junior (1930,) he already won the Belgian Championship and a lot of other races. He was a very fast and also elegant rider. He turns a professional in 1931. He won several races in the category but he never made his way through international cycling. The Schelprijs 1933 is his main victory. In 1939 the once so promising rider decided to put an end to his cycling career. Jozef Horemans's nickname was 'Flander'. Another Jozef Horemans, belonging to the same generation, received the nickname of 'Kemper'.



July 31

For the first time since 1907 the riders don't have to ride an extra big loop. As a consequence the Scheldeprijs takes place only on ten local laps of 16,5 km. It is for sure the first time so many people attend the event. Nothing less than 101 professional riders are at the start: a complete success! Hamerlinck, Vissers, Tommies, Moerenhout, Verniers and Binst break in the final lap and are on their way to sprint for victory. Léon Tommies is the surprising winner as he defeats big favorite 'Don Fredo' Fred Hamerlinck.

Léon Tommies

(°Anderlecht 04.12.1909-+Evere 02.09.1995)

In 1932 while he was taking part at his first professional season, Léon, won the famous Circuit of Paris. He also took 5 in Paris-Brussels, 9 in the Tour of Flanders and 12 in Paris-Roubaix. In 1933 he took 2 in the Tour of Flanders. In 1934 he won the Scheldeprijs. After that his career came suddenly to an end. He suffered from health problems, lost his motivation and stopped racing in 1936 when he was only 27 years old.





July 30

78 riders took the start of the 25th Scheldeprijs. Four riders attacked in the final part: Léopold Gérard, Staf Deloor, Wardje Vissers and Karke Loncke. Vissers and Loncke sprinted for victory. Loncke, a very fast rider, was definitely the best.

Gerard Loncke

(°Overpelt 15.01.1905-+Neerpelt 13.03.1979)

Gerard 'Karke' Loncke won the junior Belgian Championship in the junior category in 1926. As a professional rider he won the Scheldeprijs in 1935 and the Circuit of the Flemish Regions in 1930. He won two stages in the Tour (1931-1932) and also two in the Giro (1933). He was also a very good rider in track events. He put an end to his career just before the beginning of the war. He was the best rider of the province of Limburg before the war.





July 28

The 73 participants made the race very lively from start to finish. The race was decided in the last lap when four riders went in the break. Those sprinted together for victory and Marcel Van Schil was definitely the fastest guy. He defeated Schoten rider Fran Van Hassel by several lengths.



Marcel Van Schil (°Boechout 11.09.1912-+Edegem 23.02.2008)

Marcel, a really strong guy, was a very fast rider. He was Belgian champion in the youth category, took the second place of the first Belgian Championship for beginners in 1929 and won the junior national title in 1932 in Mortsel. He turned a professional in 1936. He then won the Scheldeprijs, the race of Mechelen and was also the second in the Tour of Limburg. In 1937, he won in Herk-de-Stad and in Kontich. World War II of course disrupted his career, which he ended in 1948.







27th SCHELDEPRIJS July 27

There were 67 professionals in the Scheldeprijs, ready to ride twelve laps through Brasschaat and the Botermelk. Nine cyclists (Verveer, D'Hooghe, Croon, Huts, Jansen, Grysolle, Van Theemsche, Van den Driessche and Hendrickx) go into the last round with a nice advantage. Jansen could not keep up and the remaining eight sprint for the victory. With a mighty sprint Sylvain Groselle claimed the first place.



Sylvain Grysolle (°Wichelen 12.12.1915-+Aalst 19.01.1985)

Grysolle always stayed down-to-earth, but despite that he was a competitor to take into account for over fifteen seasons (1936-1950). He won the Schaal Sels twice (1935, 1936). In 1937 he won the Scheldeprijs, in 1938 the Omloop der Vlaamse Gewesten and the Championship of Flanders (Koolskamp). During World War II he added the Waalse Pijl to his record of achievements, but the icing on the cake came in 1945 when he won the Ronde van Vlaanderen. In 1948 he also finished first in the Omloop Het Volk (afters Fausto Coppi was disqualified).



28th SCHELDEPRIJS August 2

Eighty-two riders gather for the start in Schoten. Three laps before the end only 22 riders remain: Kemps and Tersago in the lead and a peloton of 20 other riders. In the one-to-last-lap in Brasschaat the leaders had been joined by nine other riders. Dignef and De Bruyne break away from this group and Toontje Dignef wins the sprint in Schoten.

Antoon Dignef (°Velm 09.10.1910-+Sint-Truiden 09.04.1991)

Toon Dignef was the fourth of thirteen children. He lived in Landen. In 1938 he won the Scheldeprijs. He ended 26th (1933) and 20st (1935) In the Tour de France and third in the Vuelta (1935) and 2nd in Paris-Nice in the same year. Dignef was professional from 1932 until 1941 and had to stop his successful career due to WW II.



29th SCHELDEPRIJS August 1

The Scheldeprijs in 1939 took place a few months before the outbreak of WWII. It rained all day. The 90 participants had to ride 12 laps each of 13.5 km. On the final lap, four riders got away, of whom Achiel Buysse was by far the quickest.

Achiel Buysse (°Lochristi 18.12.1918-+Wetteren 23.07.1984)

was among the better Belgian professionals, but his career was thwarted by the war. Even so, he achieved 40 victories, including the Scheldeprijs twice, the Belgian Championship and also and above all the Tour of Flanders, which he won three times and of which, together with Magni, Leman and Museeuw, he is still the record holder. He was the father-in-law of Michel Vaarten. Achiel rode professionally between 1938 and 1950. His greatest successes: 1940-41-43 Tour of Flanders; 1939-48 Scheldeprijs; 1947 Omloop der Vlaamse Gewesten; 1948 Championship of Belgium
