



108th SCHELDEPRIJS

October 14

In 2002 Robbie McEwen won the 90th Scheldeprijs (ahead of Tom Steels). He was the first Australian on the long honors list. Only eighteen years later he gets a successor: Caleb Ewan, the small, ultra-fast kangaroo, spearheading the Lotto team won, just like Robbie at that time, with great dominance, on the Churchilliaan in Schoten. Caleb was untouchable, for Pascal Ackermann, Niccolò Bonifazio and Bryan Coquard. Pascal Ackermann was disqualified immediately after the finish. The German unable to match Ewan's sprint, moved from his line, causing a touch of wheels and leading to the crash of August Jensen (Den), Pierre Barbier (Fra) and Ivan Garcia (Esp). The jury did not hesitate and posted Bonifazio and Coquard on two and three. 169 riders started (due to the corona pandemic, not in Terneuzen but in Schoten!). Nathan Van Hooydonck was the first attacker. Moments later an early break with eight riders was formed: Mark Cavendish (three-time winner!), Gruzdev, Schär, McCabe, Juul Jensen, Wirtgen, Askey and Havik, but as expected, in the final lap they were caught by the peloton. The race story is thus written, but what preceded this edition in the conference room of the organization was of a different order. Due to the corona pandemic, the Scheldeprijs could not take place on the originally scheduled date (April 8th). In the end, the race was postponed to October 14th. The cycling fans were asked to follow the Scheldeprijs from the television at their homes. Due the corona situation and the decision of the Dutch government, the start wasn't be given in Terneuzen, but in Schoten. The first time since 1995. In addition, the race was limited to ten local laps, just like in... 1982! The Churchilliaan and the center of Schoten were desolate. A very strange experience, but there was no other option, it was either that or canceling the race. The 108th edition will be remembered in history as a very exceptional one: without an audience, in October, never seen before!

The little Australian (Korean mother, Australian father) is one of the best sprinters of his generation. He has won five stages in the Tour so far (3 in 2019, 2 in 2020), three in the Giro and one in the Vuelta. He won the Hamburg Classic in 2016, the Tour of Korea in 2015 and as a youth rider he became 2nd in the World U23 Championships in 2014 (Ponferrada) and he was stage winner in the Tour of the Future.

Caleb Ewan was designated to be on the honors list of the Scheldeprijs, and that has happened in this edition.

109th SCHELDEPRIJS

JASPER PHILIPSEN, FIRST BELGIUM WINNER, 15 YEARS AFTER TOM BOONEN

Again a Scheldeprijs in the spring, after the October edition of 2020. Still, it took quite some effort before the 109th edition could take-off in Terneuzen. The official go-ahead for the race was not given until a few hours before due to the harsh weather conditions with strong winds and isolated snow showers combined with the still lingering ghost of Corona. It was also the Corona virus that already eliminated some of the teams even before the race was started. The teams of Trek Segafredo with ex-world champion Mads Pedersen and Groupama-FDJ with French champion Arnaud Demare, were not allowed to start. Still 149 riders, among them several top sprinters, left Terneuzen at 12:45 pm.

As expected, immediately after the start, the peloton split into several echelons. Pushed by a tail wind the riders competed 50km in the first hour. A first echelon with 14 riders was formed by Bennett, Philipsen, Van Moer, Ackermann, Schwarzmann, Burghardt, Politt, Morkov, Danny van Poppel, Vahtra, Nizzolo, Walscheid, Rickaert and Russ.

A second group, 40 seconds behind (" (Kristoff, Merlier, Bol, Cavendish, S n chal, De Bondt, Dewulf, Selig, Van Lerberghe, Koch, Mozzato, Siskevicius, Van Gestel, Van Schip, Bugter, Havik), and the peloton at 1'45". After a long battle the first two groups merged and the right train had left the station, the peloton wouldn't see them again. When approaching Schoten Tim Merlier missed a curve and took Alexander Kristoff along in his fall, both had to suspend the race. No other major events occurred and a group of 29 riders went to the finish in Schoten. The main favorite, Sam Bennett, was surprisingly beaten by Jasper Philipsen, the first Belgium winner since Tom Boonen (2006!), Mark Cavendish completed the podium (for the sixth time after his first win in 2007) at 3rd place.

The 2021 season didn't start that successful for Jasper Philipsen. Of course, after the win in Schoten the odds have turned and Jasper now can continue his hunt for victories with a load of self-esteem.

Since this year he is a rider of the Alpecin-Fenix team in which he has to prove himself, next to Mathieu van der Poel and colleague-sprinter Tim Merlier Philipsen, only 23 years old, is one of Belgium most talented riders and has proven that he can compete at the international stage. He confirmed his talent with a win in the Vuelta and a stage in in the Tour Down Under in 2020 and with several close results as 21-year old in the Tour de France. As amateur he won Paris-Tours in 2017. Hamburger Philipsen (Jasper lives in the Limburg town of Ham) is a very promising winner of the Schelderpijs!

ALEXANDER KRISTOFF, TRUE VIKING TRIUMPHS OVER THE WEATHER

After the Covid-19 pandemic, there were high expectations for the first Scheldeprijs. This did not deter the weather maker, which resulted in plenty of wind and rain, the perfect ingredients to get off to a flying start in Terneuzen and turn it into a real race against the wind.

The 136 starters had the same idea, which meant the peloton was soon in pieces, spread out over the blustery Zeeland roads. A first group, initially consisting of 19, then 15 and finally 14 riders, immediately took a half-minute lead and would never be overtaken, however hard the second group, including three riders from Quickstep-Alpha Vinyl and from Lotto-Soudal, struggled to make a comeback. Unfortunately for them, the leaders were far ahead and stayed there.

The frontrunners (Selig, Kristoff, Bennett, Meeus, Mullen, Van Poppel, Bol, Van Uden, Welsford, Theuns, McLay, Waerenskjold, Philipsen and Merlier) reached Schoten with around a 40-second lead. It gradually decreased and it became clear that the winner was out front. Most predictions focused on the Alpecin-Fenix duo Philipsen-Merlier but it was soon obvious that, like the other frontrunners, they were running out of steam. All except one: Alexander Kristoff, who had claimed victory seven years earlier. The strong Norwegian of the Walloon Intermarché-Wanty-Groupe Gobert, launched a ferocious attack on the cobbled Broekstraat. With his surging pedal strokes, impressive strength, *and full of determination*, Alexander, powered towards Churchillaan where he won the Scheldeprijs for the second time!

This year he is racing for Intermarché-Wanty-Groupe Gobert and has already won the Clásica Almeria and now the Scheldeprijs for the second time.

JASPER PHILIPSEN, THE FASTEST IN THE WORLD?

Under bright spring sunshine, 142 riders set off from Terneuzen. Casper Pedersen (Soudal Quick-Step) and Shane Archbold (Bora Hansgrohe) do not start because of illness. Taking part is: Mathieu van der Poel. Following the example of (in the past) Cancellara and Sagan, he is coming to warm up for Paris-Roubaix and that should motivate top favourite Jasper Philipsen even more.

The weather is beautiful, there is little wind, everyone is in good spirits and the peloton lets a group of seven riders go for the traditional early escape: Cyriel Desal, Ruben Apers, Filippo Ridolfo, Bram Dissel, Vincent Hoppezak, Giulio Masotto and Josh Kench. They build up a lead of no more than four minutes. Thus the peloton is keeping them within range. The last 4 of the early escapees, Cyriel Desal, Ruben Apers, Filippo Ridolfo and Bram Dissel are caught on the last local lap, 4 km from the finish. The expected mass sprint is inevitable. Mathieu van der Poel is pushing the pace but takes no part in the sprint. One who does is top favourite Jasper Philipsen. He smoothly gets the measure of Sam Welsford (second last year) and Mark Cavendish, who continues to add to his record in the Scheldeprijs (3x1st, 2x2nd, 2x3rd, or 7x podium in 8 attempts). The 'vlam van Ham' takes the Scheldeprijs for the second time. In the press we read: "Philipsen is the fastest sprinter in the world"!

2023: 4 wins (until 05.04) (Scheldeprijs, 2 stages Tirreno-Adriatico, Classic Brugge-De Panne)

Everything suggests that Philipsen will not stop at two wins in the Scheldeprijs!
