GROTE SCHELDEPRIJS TE SCHOTEN

René Martens doet slavenwerk maar wordt in de spurt geklopt door Ludo Peeters



Schoten. — Voor wie er soms nog moest aan twifelen: Ludo Peeters is momenteel de beste renner die er in ons landje rondloopt. De laatste twielfeels moet hij gaten in de Grote Scheldeprijs wel overnageld hebben, al was niet iedereen even enthousiast over zijn zege. En dan spreken we vooral over de koninklijke in de persoon van René Martens die met Ludo naar de meest vroege geïmagineerde maar weinig andere koprijders de laatste ronden en liet het grote werk over aan Martens, die aan de streep dan ook geklopt werd door Peeters.

Deze 68e Scheldeprijs heeft overtuigen een hoopje eigenaardige finale gekregen, nadat eerdermoer Clotilde C'quadron er voor zorgde dat er ook in de aanvangsfase nog wat te zien was geweest. De Wual murede er reeds vanonder na veertig kilometer in het gezelschap van Leo Van Thienen, al moest die later zijn gezelschap laten gaan. Eddy Verstraeten, Miel Gysenans, Rudy Cottinens, Jan Bogaert, Eddy Vanhaeren, René Martens en Miel Dehaes kwamen vervolggers Clotilde gezelschap houden, maar blijkbaar zat er ook weer de meesten onder hen niet meer in dan dat zij zich eens in eigen strek hadden gehoord. En na 140 kilometer kon men met een propere lei beginnen.

Tien kilometer vander werd de rust brutaal verstoord door Roger De Vlaeminck die daar met zoveel overtuiging op de solokeer ging alsof hij de kerktoeren van Schoten in de verte ontwaarde. Vele kilometer verder zou zijn voorsprong zelfs 145 bedragen, maar dat bleef smelt even en weg als het er gekomen was. Op dat ogenblik begon Ludo Peeters aan zijn festival. Goed zeventig kilometer van het einde was hij aan de haal, in het bezet-

naar de achtergrond zou verdron- gen worden, ging dat nu niet op, want uit de achtergrond waren inmiddels René Martens en de Nederlander Theo De Ruyt komen opdagen.

EEN STRIJD TUSSEN TWEE DLO'S

In de eerste van de drie plaatselijke omlopen, telkens 18 km lang, kwamen zij eerst bij Eddy Schepers, terwijl nog in dezelfde ronde dit trio mee aan de leiding kwam. De vijf waren blijkbaar niet voorbereid om samen naar de meet te gaan, want een ronde verder schudde Ludo Peeters nog maar eens aan de boom. De eerste die daar als een rijpe appel afviel was de Nederlander Van Houweelingen. De enige die er gepast kon reageren was de oersterke Limburger René Martens.

En van dat moment af kregen we een hoogst eigenaardig, heel te bewonderen dat kilometers lang aansloopte. Aan de leiding fierste René Martens met in zijn wiel

Ludo Peeters. Amper honderd meter achterop volgden de Nederlander De Ruyt, met in zijn wiel Eddy Schepers, die zich alles scheldefrifoende. Het bevestigde dus een renner van de ploeg Fred De Bruyne met in zijn wiel een van de ploeg Gadeffoet, gevolgd door een renner van de ploeg Gadeffoet, met in zijn wiel iemand van Fred Debruyne. Daar achter had zich, onder aanvoering van Jan Jacobs, nog een tienkoppige achtervolgend groepje gevormd, dat echter niet vernschiedde de eerste twee duo's nog te bekegen. Voordat draaide het gevecht langzaam in het voordeel van de eerste twee uit. Of moeten we zeggen van René Martens die De Ruyt kon terugslaan? Nadat de kloof lang niet onopgemerkt bleef, hap aan het einde van de tweede plaatselijke omloop het duo Peeters-Martens schokte na sekonde weg van de twee achtervolgers, die intussen al met hun verschil werden geklopt. Dat er aan de meet niet voor scherven ge- rechtigheid geschiedde, daarover hielden we het hoger reeds.

Ludo Peeters (°Hoogstraten 09.08.1953)

was a strong rider, who performed best as a domestique. He won three stages in the Tour de France, wore the yellow jersey twice, and finished eighth in 1980. He won, mostly as lieutenant of Jan Raas, a whole series of classics (2x Paris-Brussels, 2x Henninger Turm, 2x Scheldeprijs, Blois-Chaville, the Zurich Championship, Kuurne-Brussels-Kuurne) but the absolute peak was not for him. He narrowly missed winning Paris-Roubaix. Even so, Ludo had a long and splendid professional career (1974-1990).

Ad Wijnands (°Maastricht 10.03.1959)

Adje, Adje Patatje. He was a professional during fourteen years. Even if he was not the best rider of his generation, he nevertheless was a very important one in the years 80. 1981 was maybe his best season: two stages in the Tour, the Scheldeprijs, the Tour of Belgium and victories in Heverlee, Boxmeer, Simpelveld, Voerendaal as well as a stage win in the Star of Bessèges. That same year he also finished the 2nd in the GP Cerami and the 5th in the Flèche Walloon! In '82 he won the GP Dortmund, in '84 the GP Impanis, in '86 the Tour of Limburg and the 1 May race in Hoboken, in '88 the GP Bessèges, in '90 the GP Benego, in '91 the Star of Bessèges. Adje won a Total of 49 professional races on the road. In '81 and '82 he won the Six days of Maastricht (associated with René Pijnen). In '84

he chooses to follow Raas when this one decided not to stay with Peter Post.

After his career he managed a garden center ('de Winhof') in Eijsden and he also made some studies to get a cycling coach diploma.

Due to the Football World Cup in 1982, the Tour de France finishes on July 25. The day after the criterium period is launched. The Scheldeprijs was supposed to be organized on Tuesday 27, which was a problem as the Criterium of Ronse was planned on the same day. The Scheldeprijs organizers deny postponing their event as it is linked to the local feast in their city. What they do however is to cancel the big lap. The event is raced on the small laps only.

62 riders take the start and the race is rather animated. Ludo Schurgers and Jan Nevens break from an eleven-man group. The rider from Limburg is the fastest and wins the sprint.

(°Temse 03.12.1957 - +Bornem
23.01.2024)

This rider native from the Belgian region of Waes was an all-rounder. He was really fast in the sprint and also very performing in short distance time-trials. He won 247 races during his 22 years long career, including 115 in the professional category. In 1990 he won 17 races and was awarded for being the rider who won the greater number of international victories. Amongst many other races, he won the E3-Prize in Harelbeke and the Three Days of De Panne in '81 and the

He almost won Paris-Roubaix but could not do it. Anyway he achieved a brilliant and long professional career (1974-1990).

Adrie van der Poel (°Bergen op Zoom 17.06.1959)

Adrie was a professional rider between 1981 and 2000, which means a 20 years career! He won the Championship of the Netherlands in '87, the Championship of Zurich in '82, Paris-Brussels in '85, the Scheldeprijs in '85, the Clásica San Sebastian in '85, the Tour of Flanders in '86, Créteil-Chaville in '87, Liège-Bastogne-Liège in '88, the Amstel Gold Race in '90. He took part in ten Tour winning two stages. He was also a cyclo-cross specialist and after he finished six times on the second step of the podium in the World Championship, he finally won the gold medal in 1996.
